#### **Review 1: Meet Me Downtown**

This is the fourth in a series of novels by Tom Lee involving Danny Yip and his team at the Los Angeles Police Department. This time the lieutenant is battling a very nasty gang of South American drug traffickers. The more they learn about the gang, the less things make sense. There are plenty of clues, but solving the puzzle is very difficult. While the detectives are working it all out, there are plenty of gunfights and horrible murders. Lee can tell a good fast-moving story and those who like their reading to be an action movie on paper will enjoy this story, which ends with a big surprise when they find out who the master criminal is. My one complaint is that Lee seems more like a cartoonist than a writer and the characters never quite come alive.

#### **Review 2: Puzzles**

This very weakly named novel is by a new Canadian writer, Fay Rider, and luckily it is far more imaginative than that title makes you think. This is a crime story with a difference. The star detective is no ordinary police officer, but a super computer of the twenty-ninth century. Some things it seems will never change though- human society throughout its five hundred and thirty five planets is under attack from a new drug, which has very strange results. The plot is very clever and I certainly could not guess what was going to happen. The writing is excellent and you will certainly love Mel the Brain.

#### Whales

Whaling, or the hunting and killing of whales, is something many people feel very strongly about. On the one hand, there are people who say it is part of their *culture* to hunt whales and want to continue, and on the other side there are those who think it is a terrible thing to do and want all whale-hunting *banned* completely. Almost every year you can read news stories about Japanese whaling boats being followed and stopped from hunting by members of Greenpeace, many of them from Australia and New Zealand.

Whales used to be a major source of oil and in the 19<sup>th</sup> century millions were killed for this product. Whale numbers did become very *low* and whales might have died out if there had not been a stop to their hunting. Now, though, numbers have increased so the whale hunters argue it is safe to hunt a small number every year. They are probably correct. We use many types of animals for food and other things, so why should whales be any different? The problem is that there are people who feel whales are very special and intelligent animals and that killing them is totally wrong. The two sides have very different points of view so it is difficult for them to talk to one another. Perhaps there is one argument both sides can agree on: whale-watching has become a very big tourist activity and earns maybe a billion dollars a year. Perhaps then whale-hunting is not economically sensible.



### Part 1

*Chris Lo, a radio presenter, interviews the captain of a holiday ship.*

Interviewer [I]: Welcome to Radio Wanchai's Interview of the Day. We heard cruise-ship captain Mike Black was staying at the <sup>1</sup>Wanchai Palace Hotel so we called and asked if we could talk to him and he very kindly agreed. Hello, Captain.

Mike Black [M]: Hello, please call me Mike.

I: Yes, sir. Can I first ask what you are doing in Hong Kong?

M: Well, it is part work and part pleasure. I just love coming here <sup>2B</sup>for the dim sum and I also <sup>2E</sup>get my uniforms here. You cannot beat Hong Kong tailors. But as well as <sup>2B</sup>eating and <sup>2E</sup>getting some new clothes, I want to check some details ready for bringing my ship here in <sup>3</sup>October.

I: Your ship is the beautiful <sup>5F</sup>Blue Shadow, isn't it?

M: Yes, I work for the Blue Seas Cruise Company and we have four ships, the <sup>5B</sup>Blue Cloud, the <sup>5H</sup>Blue Wind, the <sup>5D</sup>Blue Wave and my own <sup>5F</sup>Blue Shadow.

I: All such <sup>6</sup>lovely names. I believe they are not very big ships. Is that true?

M: Yes, though you must not think they are small, but in comparison with some really big liners we offer smaller luxury ships. For instance, the Blue shadow carries <sup>7</sup>378 passengers along with 296 member of crew.

I: <sup>10</sup>[sounding very surprised] Did I hear right? 296 members of crew for only <sup>7</sup>378 passengers. That's almost one worker for each passenger!

M: Well, not quite, but you can tell we take good care of our passengers and to do that we need a lot of sailors, engineers, cooks, waiters, cleaning staff, hairdressers, entertainment officers and so on.

I: And you are all coming here in October?

M: That's right. We spend a few months every year sailing between Vancouver and Alaska and as it gets a bit too cold up there we come down to this part of the world. We will start with a few 9-day cruises from Hong Kong with stops in a number of Vietnamese ports and ending the trip in Singapore. We also do visits to Shanghai, Tokyo and Bangkok at different times.

I: I've never been on a cruise. What do people do on them?

M: When you are aboard we have lots of entertainment for you. You can even learn some simple phrase in the various languages you will meet.

I: You mean Chinese and Vietnamese?

M: Yes, and Thai, Malay and Japanese.

I: Interesting. What sort of people go on your cruises?
